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Renaissance Art: A Very Short Introduction  
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art in renaissance italy sets the art of that time in its context exploring why it was created and in particular looking at who commissioned the palaces and cathedrals the paintings and the sculptures

you are what you own so believed many of the elite men and women of renaissance italy the notion that a person's belongings transmit something about their personal history status and character was renewed in the fifteenth and early sixteenth centuries

objects of virtue explores the multiple meanings and values of the objects with which families like the medici este and gonzaga surrounded themselves this lavishly illustrated volume examines the complicated relationships between the so called fine arts painting and sculpture and artifacts of other kinds for which artistry might be as important as utility furniture jewelry and vessels made of gold silver and bronze precious and semi precious stone glass and ceramic the works discussed were designed and made by artists as famous as andrea mantegna raphael and michelangelo as well as by lesser known specialists goldsmiths gem engravers glassmakers and maiolica painters

a glance at the pages of art in renaissance italy shows at once its freshness and breadth of approach which includes how and why works of art buildings prints and other kinds of art came to be how men and women of the renaissance regarded art and artists and why works of renaissance art look the way they do and what this means to us unlike other books on the subject this one covers not only florence and rome here too are venice and the veneto assisi siena milan pavia padua mantua verona ferrara urbino and naples each governed in a distinctly different manner every one with its own political and social structures that inevitably affected artistic styles spanning more than three centuries the narrative brings to life the rich tapestry of italian renaissance society and the art works that are its enduring legacy throughout special features evoke and document the people and places of this dynamic age

new to the second edition is a fresh open design and expanded page size with more color pictures a fuller discussion of individual cities notably milan naples and venice a section on 16th century genoa and more contemporary voice boxes the artists biographies have now been incorporated into the main text and more discursive captions with stylistic analyses of artworks have been added book jacket

many famous artworks of the italian renaissance were made to celebrate love marriage and family they were the pinnacles of a tradition dating from early in the era of commemorating betrothals marriages and the birth of children by commissioning extraordinary objects maiolica glassware jewels textiles paintings that were often also exchanged as gifts this volume is the first comprehensive survey of artworks arising from renaissance rituals of love and marriage and makes a major contribution to our understanding of renaissance art in its broader cultural context the impressive range of works gathered in these pages extends from birth trays painted in the early fifteenth century to large canvases on mythological themes that titian painted in the mid 1500s each work of art would have been recognized by contemporary viewers for its prescribed function within the private domestic domain book jacket

this book focuses on the values priorities and motives of patrons and the purposes and functions of art works produced north and south of the alps and in post byzantine crete it begins by considering the social range and character of renaissance patronage and ends with a study of hans holbein the younger and the reform of religious images in basle and england viewing renaissance art considers a wide range of audiences and patrons from the rulers of france to the poorest confraternities in florence the overriding premise is that art was not a neutral matter of stylistic taste but an aspect of material production in which values were invested whether religious cultural social or political

art power and patronage in renaissance italy has a freshness and breadth of approach that sets the art in its context exploring why it was created and who commissioned the palaces cathedrals paintings and sculptures for as the authors claim italian renaissance artists were no more solitary geniuses than are most architects and commercial artists today this book covers not only the foremost artistic centers of rome and florence here too are venice and the veneto assisi siena milan pavia genoa padua mantua verona ferrara urbino and naples each city revealing unique political and social structures that influenced its artistic styles the book includes genealogies of influential families listings of popes and doges plans of cities a time chart a bibliography a glossary and an index book jacket

illustrates all of the major art making processes of the period richly illustrated with high quality reproductions and new photography of recent restorations it presents the classic canon of renaissance painting and sculpture in full while expanding the scope of conventional surveys by offering a more thorough coverage of architecture decorative and domestic arts and print media

considers the business of picture making in the renaissance in particular the text discusses the role of the artist and the functions of works of art in relation to their various kinds of audience

the chronology of the italian renaissance its character and context have long been a topic of discussion among scholars some date its beginnings to the fourteenthcentury work of giotto others to the generation of masaccio brunelleschi and donatello that flourished from around 1400 the close of the renaissance has also proved elusive mannerism for example is variously considered to be an independent but subsidiary late aspect of renaissance style or a distinct style in its own right

during the later 15th and in the 16th centuries pictures began to be made without action without place for heroism pictures more rueful than celebratory in part renaissance art adjusted to the social and economic pressures with an art we may be hard pressed to recognize under that same rubric an art not so much of perfected nature as simply artless granted the heroic and epic mode of the

renaissance was that practiced most self consciously and proudly yet it is one of the accomplishments of renaissance art that heroic and epic subjects and style occasionally made way for less affirmative subjects and compositional norms for improvisation away from the vitruvian ideal the limits of idealizing art during the very period denominated as high renaissance is a topic that involves us in the history of class prejudice of gender stereotypes of the conceptualization of the present of attitudes toward the ordinary and of scruples about the power of sight exploring the low style leads us particularly to works of art intended for display in private settings as personally owned objects potentially as signs of quite personal emotions rather than as subscriptions to publicly vaunted ideologies not all of them show shepherds or peasants none of them not even giorgione's *la tempesta* is a classic pastoral idyll the rosso stile is to be understood as more comprehensive than that the issue is not only who is represented but whether the work can or cannot be fit into the mold of a basically affirmative art

in this incisive study hellmut wohl redefines style in the italian renaissance in light of contemporary testimony and close rereadings of seminal works through analysis of visual and textual evidence he posits that renaissance artists and their viewers conceived of art as decoration of surfaces offering a new approach to the issue of style wohl suggests that the scientific dimensions of early modern art works were less important to contemporaries than their function as ornamentation

the fifteenth century saw the evolution of a distinct and powerfully influential european artistic culture but what does the familiar phrase renaissance art actually refer to through engaging discussion of timeless works by artists such as jan van eyck leonardo da vinci and michelangelo and supported by illustrations including colour plates tom nichols offers a masterpiece of his own as he explores the truly original and diverse character of the art of the renaissance

this title was first published in 2000 michelangelo gave his painting of *leda and the swan* to an apprentice rather than hand it over to the emissary of the duke of ferrara who had commissioned it he was apparently disgusted by the failure of the emissary who was probably more used to buying pigs than discussing art to accord the picture and the artist the value they deserved any discussion of works of art and material culture implicitly assigns them a set of values whether these values be monetary cultural or religious they tend to constrict the ways in which such works can be discussed the variety of potential forms of valuation becomes particularly apparent during the italian renaissance when relations between the visual arts and humanistic studies were undergoing rapid

changes against an equally fluid social economic and political background in this volume 13 scholars explicitly examine some of the complex ways in which a variety of values might be associated with italian renaissance material culture papers range from a consideration of the basic values of the materials employed by artists to the manifestation of cultural values in attitudes to dress and domestic devotion by illuminating some of the ways in which values were constructed they provide a broader context within which to evaluate renaissance material culture

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
